The Declaration of Independence is a peculiar thing. It's a literary masterpiece written jointly by a committee of 50 people. It's short and punchy just 1,310 words long — but still somehow daunting and difficult to get to grips with. What did people at the time make of it? What did it change? Why does it matter? In this course, we explore the fascinating origins, misunderstood purpose, and extraordinary global legacy of the Declaration of Independence.

Richard Bell is professor of history at the University of Maryland and author of the book Stolen: Five Free Boys Kidnapped into Slavery and Their Astonishing Odyssey Home.

California Noir (

California has long been associated with fantasies of instant wealth, boundless opportunity, and self-reinvention. Fed by the Hollywood glamour machine, the idea of the "California Dream" solidified in the 1920s and peaked after WWII. But by the late '30s, a shadow version of the California Dream was taking shape, pointing to a nightmare reality. Expressed in the margins of legitimate cultural discourse, noir named a critique, an attitude, a mood, a language, and an aesthetic of alienation. In this course, we will discuss some foundational California noir movies and texts.

Rock 'n' Roll's First 🌢 🔞 🌗 **Decade: From Elvis to** the Beatles

This course covers the first 10 years of rock and roll, which shook the world from the mid-1950s to the early 1960s. It spans the ascendance of pioneers like Elvis Presley, Chuck Berry, and Little Richard to the harmonizing vocal groups, surf, soul, and girl groups of the early '60s. It features greats like the Everly Brothers, Buddy Holly, Ray Charles, and the Beach Boys, with plenty of rare film clips of the heroes in action. It also celebrates the record labels, the producers, disk jockeys, songwriters, and teenage audience that helped make it happen.

Richie Unterberger is an author of rock history. His next book, Do What You Fear Most: The History of the Velvet Underground, will be published in Spring 2026.

This class will discuss the various psychological processes that make unlimited choice a very mixed blessing.

Most Americans place the lion's share of the blame for the Vietnam catastrophe on President Lyndon Johnson. Presidents Truman, Eisenhower, and Kennedy all upped the ante by steadily raising the stakes in Southeast Asia. This course will delve into the crucial decisions made by LBJ's predecessors which led to our nation's worst foreign policy debacle of the twentieth century.

Mick Chantler has taught for OLLI @ Berkeley for more than a decade. His interests include early America, the Civil War, the Cold War, and the history of baseball.
