## **Course Description**

Comic Henny Youngman famously joked that the secret of a happy marriage remains a secret. That may be true, but marriage is an enduring social construct sanctioned by law, custom, and belief. In many cultures landing a spouse is an alluring rite of passage into adulthood. Whether we personally view the institution of marriage as satisfying or stressful, lifelong or episodic, fueled by love or lust, entered into for security or opportunity, one truth we can agree on is that writers find in marriage fertile subject matter for storytelling.

In this course we'll discuss marital issues that esteemed authors' stories breathe life into: loyalty, growth, money, sex, procreation, tolerance, conflict, power, disappointment, aging, infidelity, affirmation, divorce, and more. Besides discovering these literary artists' perspectives on marriage, we'll discuss the elements of their stories, focusing where relevant on narrative point of view, character, setting, cultural context, story arc, humor, themes, imagery, and resolution.

Each week's reading selections include one standard-length short story and one micro-fiction story. As always, we'll look to literature to nourish our longing to understand what's essential about life.
