The rise and fall of world communism was one of the great dramas of the 20th century, born in wars (World War I, World II), offering an alternative modernity to that of the capitalist world, and ultimately succumbing to the pressures of Cold War, capitalist globalization, and popular disaffection. The result was either systemic collapse (the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe) or a fundamental alteration of key features of the communist economic system (China, Vietnam, Laos). Beyond these three, two unreformed communist regimes remain: North Korea, mired in Stalinism; and Cuba, mired in a brittle, oligarchic regime.

Past versions of this OLLI course presented a historical overview of this drama. The 2025 version of this course will instead address controversial questions about the domestic and foreign policies of communist states.
