Course description

Whether they are belting out rock tunes or painting portraits, Chinese artists are bold and innovative. This course explores the significance of China's arts and culture scene post-1989 through the Internet era.

Course outline

Week 1: The Power of the Powerless

Introduction to contemporary China and the Sexy Beijing project. Discussion of working as a journalist and filmmaker in Beijing. Overview of the impact of the arts and youth culture in China and the current climate as it relates to creative expression and censorship.

Week 2: Rock'n roll with Chinese Characteristics

Musician Cui Jian; 1989 and Tiananmen; an introduction to basic Mandarin pronunciation.

Week 3: AK-47

Artist Zhang Dali, novelist Wang Shuo, Modern Sky publishing; cultural expression before and after the rise of the Internet.

Week 4: I'm Not Your Baby

Women in the arts; musicians Cobra and Hang on the Box; novelist Sheng Keyi; activist Li Tingting and the Feminist 5.

Week 5: Like a Siberian Butterfly

LBGTQ voices in the arts; Queer Comrades, Fan Popo; performance art.

Week 6: Through my Lens

Chinese filmmakers and social media; Ai Weiwei; future voices.
