Turning Points: Five American artists and writers explore the intersection of Identity, Memory, and History

This course will make use of memoir, film, and painting to explore the ways that five American writers and artists understood some of the defining moments in their lives. We will study the work of **Chiura Obata, James Baldwin, Hung Liu, Annette Gordon-Reed,** and **Nikole Hannah-Jones** in the context of turning points in American history including migration, emancipation, internment, and the Civil Rights movement.

Participants will reflect on these turning points and their own family stories through brief responses experimenting with the techniques of memoir during the course.
